39 Confirmation of minutes

The minutes of the Overview and Scrutiny Committee meeting held on 1 March 2021 were **approved** as a correct record.

40 Overview and Scrutiny Work Programme 2021/22 – update and planning

The Corporate Director Resources (and Section 151 Officer), Clare James, submitted a report that updated the committee about the delivery of the Overview and Scrutiny Work Programme 2021/22.

The Chairman clarified an error in the report at point 3.2 in the final paragraph that referred to Councillor Matthew Vincent the Chair of the group. It should have stated 'prospective Chair' as the group had not met.

The Chairman, Councillor Ibison, then proceeded to go through the report.

Members asked about the paused review of Wyre's Contact with the YMCA and the date when the consultant's report will be completed. Democratic Services informed members that once this information was received, the committee would be informed.

The Chairman proposed that there are further discussions about the recent Review of Scrutiny once the Centre for Governance and Scrutiny workshop, on 17 June 2021 at 6 pm, with Ian Parry is completed. The committee **agreed** this was appropriate. All members of the committee would be expected to attend.

The Chairman proposed that in order to get the Review of the District Enforcement Pilot Task Group reconvened, it would be a good idea to, at the next meeting, invite Ruth Hunter, Head of Public Realm and Environmental Sustainability, to provide the committee with an update to see if the original task group's scoping document needed amending.

It was mentioned by the Chairman that the Call-in procedures task group be suspended for the time being and then relooked at in the future.

Members discussed topics such as town centres, pedestrianisation, parking fees, local tourism and 'staycations'. Councillor Matthew Vincent suggested the commissioning of a task group that would cover the area of the tourism offer in Wyre following the impacts of Covid-19 in particular. The Chairman echoed this request, and it was **agreed** by members that at the next meeting they would consider a draft-scoping document before the commissioning of this task group.

Regarding anti-social behaviour, the Chairman suggested that once the current Police and Crime Commissioner election is completed then the committee could formulate some future agenda time for this topic, which was **agreed** by members.

41 Citizens Advice Lancashire West Task Group - draft report

The Chairman of the Citizens Advice Lancashire West (CALW) Task Group, Councillor Howard Ballard introduced the report and was happy to answer any questions from members.

Members asked questions about the need of CALW in the rural areas, the levels of funding of the service and the chosen area for the digital kiosk service.

Following discussions, it was proposed by Councillor Ballard, seconded by Councillor Longton and **agreed** by the Overview and Scrutiny Committee that there should be an amendment made to recommendation number three to remove "and that they believe the best place for such a service would be at Knott End" and to be replaced with "and that the CALW will advise on the best location for such a service."

The Committee then noted the amended report and **agreed** that it will go to the next Cabinet meeting for their consideration.

The Chairman of Overview and Scrutiny thanked Councillor Ballard and the members of the CALW task group for their hard work and report. Councillor

Ballard additionally thanked the members for their contributions.

The meeting started at 6.00 pm and finished at 7.19 pm.

Council Business Plan – 4th Quarter Performance Statement 2020/21 January – March 2021

1. Purpose of report

1.1 The dashboard style report (attached) gives a quick reference to quarterly progress against the council's business plan projects and measures, along with commentary where issues have been identified.

2. Project Updates

- 2.1 There are now 18 Business Plan projects split between the three ambitions within the Business Plan Economy, People and Place.
- Whilst the majority of projects are on track, there are 7 showing Amber with minor issues.
- **2.2.1** A summary of those with minor issues (Amber) are shown below:
 - Deliver the implementation plan for Hillhouse Technology
 Enterprise Zone A Meeting has been held with Genecon to
 explore the changes required to the Implementation Plan. The
 scope of the amendments is currently being developed by Genecon
 for consideration by the Hillhouse Enterprise Zone Board. Work is
 expected to commence in April 2021.
 - Collaborate with partners to develop strategic economic plans such as the Greater Lancashire Plan - Fleetwood, Garstang and Cleveleys Partnership Boards have been established, with Poulton to begin in May 2021. Currently preparing to tender for consultants to be appointed to develop and produce Regeneration Frameworks for Cleveleys, Poulton and Garstang. This is anticipated to be completed by September 2022. There have been revisions to the Fleetwood Regeneration Framework to enable final consultation planned for July 2021. All Regeneration Framework Strategies once

- complete and alongside the Local Plan review will establish Wyre's Economic Strategy for the next 15 years.
- Develop the Fleetwood Masterplan and facilitate external funding opportunities to support the future options to transform Fleetwood over the next 20 years - Fleetwood Heritage Action Zone: Surveys and proposals due to be undertaken to facilitate bringing forward applications for properties on Lord Street, Adelaide Street, North Albert Street. Landscape Projects (Landscape Architecture Consultants) appointed to design and oversee the Custom House Square project. Additional funding granted by Historic England (HE) for project to repair the southern gable end of the Fleetwood Museum (Grant of £68,000). HE approval for consultancy work with IBI Group to develop the project plan for public realm in the HAZ and ThinkingPlace to develop the visual narrative and imagery for the Fleetwood narrative. Revisions to take place to the Fleetwood Regeneration Framework during April / May 2021 for the inclusion of an Education & Skills theme within the framework. Anticipated that the final public consultation event will take place in July 2021 before final sign off and adoption.
- Launch the next phase of the digital Wyre strategy ensuring customers have easy access to our services and that we embrace the opportunities new technologies bring – The new Civica payment system is now progressing and the target go-live date for new the website is hoped to be late June/early July.
- Review the Wyre local plan 2011-2031 Work is ongoing on the Partial Review with a renewed emphasis on using the Government's Standard Method for Housing Need as the basis for the review. A number of key documents have been updated (SCI and LDS) and will be reported to Cabinet or Portfolio Holder as appropriate. Partial Review will meet LPR1 deadline.
- Deliver the Wyre Beach Management Scheme Phase 1 planning application due date June 2021. In process of satisfying all conditions. Service surveys complete, works required to divert gas mains and protect other services. Start date for compound works deferred to September 21 to allow local businesses the summer to recover and allow continuation to phase 2. Works on site to commence in the New Year. A pre-order for rock has been made to secure supplies. Phase 2 SI application to MMO still awaited. Discussions with planning to progress planning permission and MMO licence for phase 2 through Coastal Concordat.
- Implement initiatives and promote activity to help achieve a cleaner, greener Wyre Lone volunteer beach cleaners and volunteer rangers have undertaken litter patrols throughout the winter and spring to promote appreciation of Wyre's coast, parks and countryside. Advisory Coastal safety and considerate behaviour banners have been developed and put up on site around the coast. Our volunteers have been working in partnership with the Wyre Rivers trust and helped to deliver flood mitigation measures, these have included leaky dams on the catchments higher tributaries, tree planting within the moorland Clough's and stream side (riparian)

habitats. They have also helped to plant 100's of metres of hedgerows. Wyre River and Coastal Water safety group has been set up with local police and multiple agencies to support the sharing of good practice in the River Wyre and Coastal waters with regard to safety of users and protection of the environment through partnership working. Green Flag Applications submitted for Memorial Park, WECP, Hawthorne Park, Vicarage Park and new for 2021 The Mount.

3. Performance Updates

- 3.1 In total there are 23 measures to be reported on however some of these do not have data available as they are either annual or bi-annual collection so have not been included.
- 3.2 Of the 15 Measures included on the report, 5 have a Green status, 3 Amber and 7 Red.
- **3.2.1** Further information regarding those showing as Amber are set out below.
 - Town centre vacancy rates Whilst rates are achieving against target in Fleetwood and Garstang they have increased in Cleveleys, Thornton and Poulton that has brought the overall percentage rate to within 10% of achieving target.
 - % of physically active adults although the actual figure is slightly lower than target, there was no significant difference in activity levels.
 - Money raised for good causes by the Wyre community lottery there has been a reduction in promotion of the Community Lottery
 over recent months due to the pandemic but despite this we are only
 a little under target.
- **3.2.2** Further information regarding those showing as Red are set out below.
 - Number of Businesses supported Activity has been hindered due to restrictions and closing of high streets. Plan is to visit each business in each Town Centre with Welcome Back Support Pack distribution and completion of shop counts.
 - % growth in business rate base It should be noted that there is due to be a reduction of -6.91% owing to the former Vinnolit site being demolished.
 - Out of work benefit claimant count The considerable increase will be largely driven by the COVID-19 pandemic.
 - **Positive footprints programme** the impact of the pandemic has meant the need to do this work differently and virtually so that has made it more difficult for the schools to take part in the programme.
 - **Number of leisure centre visits –** the YMCA has been impacted by lockdown closures.

- Number of volunteer hours the volunteer hours have taken a

 not taking place. The team are still supporting the volunteers wishing
 to carry on with volunteering activities as it is important for their
 health and wellbeing.

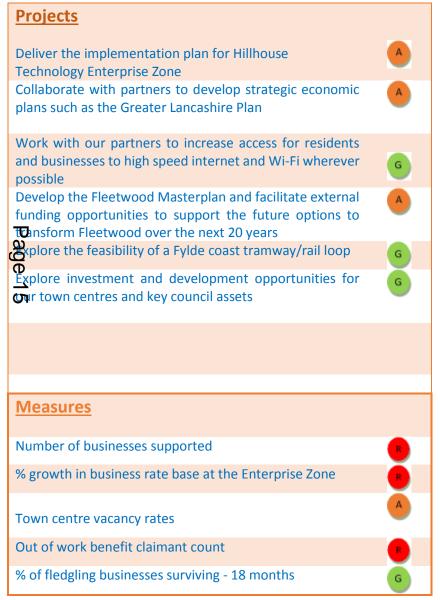

3. Current and completed work

3.1 Review of District Enforcement Task Group

Members expressed a desire to reconvene this task group at their March meeting. Although Ruth Hunter, Head of Public Realm and Environmental Sustainability, was invited to attend the June Overview and Scrutiny meeting to provide an update, it is suggested that the task group now reconvenes after Councillor Bridge, Street Scene, Parks and Open Spaces Portfolio Holder, has presented District Enforcement performance data in his Executive Report to Council on 8 July.

3.2 Review of Wyre's Tourism recovery in the light of the COVID-19 Pandemic (official name tbc)

At the last Overview and Scrutiny meeting Councillor Matthew Vincent proposed the commissioning of a task group on how tourism recovery in Wyre might be better supported by the council post-pandemic with specific interest into the 'staycation' offer in Wyre.

Members must decide whether to commission this task group.

4. Paused work

4.1 Review of Wyre's contract with the YMCA

Members asked, during their last meeting, for clarification on the likely timeline for the YMCA Leisure Centre consultant's report and review.

The Corporate Director Communities has informed Democratic Services that the Leisure Review is a large piece of work that will take place over the next year. The review has been split into three pieces of work: sport and physical activity strategy, built facilities needs assessment and then it will conclude with a leisure masterplan. Therefore, at present, the commissioning of a task group on leisure centres/YMCA contracts may not be the most appropriate time.

Members can be reassured that they will be involved in this process at the various stages and it may be advantageous for Overview and Scrutiny Committee to receive an update of this review and what the key milestones are at a future meeting.

4.2 Review of Wyre's Scrutiny Function

At the last meeting, the committee saw it appropriate to pause any work on this review until the workshop session with Ian Parry from the Centre for Governance and Scrutiny (CfGS) had been completed. All members of Cabinet, members of Overview and Scrutiny, the Corporate Management Team and Democratic Services should now have received their Microsoft Teams invitation via email.
