Lancashire County Council - Public Realm Services

1. Purpose of report

1.1 To seek approval for the continuation of the delivery of services within the public realm on behalf of Lancashire County Council.

2. Outcomes

2.1 The continued provision of high quality services including grass cutting, leaf sweeping and highway weed spraying on behalf of Lancashire County Council (LCC).

3. Recommendations

- 3.1 That the council continue with the agreement to undertake all services currently provided as referred to under section 4.5 of this report for the financial years 2021/22, 2022/23, 2023/24, 2024/25 and 2025/26.
- **3.2** That any changes to the agreement be the subject of a future report.

4. Background

- 4.1 On the 25 January 2018, Portfolio Holder approval was given to continue to undertake all services currently provided as part of the Public Realm agreement for the financial years 2019/20 and 2020/21 for £95,650 each year, which was a reduced subsidy level of £3,935 per annum.
- **4.2** It was also agreed that any changes to the agreement prior to commencement of year two would be the subject of a future report.
- 4.3 Traditionally Wyre Council has subsidised the delivery of services undertaken under the agreement mainly as a result of cutting the grass on highway verges more frequently than that specified by LCC.

- 4.4 Following a review, LCC have asked that Wyre Council enter into a new agreement for a five year period from April 2021. As part of the agreement, payments made in respect of Public Realm activities are to be increased annually subject to RPI, base month of September (no negative adjustments). Therefore year one of the new agreement, 2021/22 the payment would increase from £95,650 to £97,896.
- **4.5** The agreement covers the provision of the following services:
 - Highway verge cutting within the urban area.
 - Highway verge cutting within the rural area this agreement does not cover all rural verges as LCC make alternative provisions with some parish councils for service delivery.
 - Highway Tree Maintenance inspection and management of work by private contractors is undertaken by the council's Tree and Woodland Officer.
 - Leaf Sweeping a contribution to leaf sweeping undertaken by the council's Street Cleansing Team.
 - Weed Control the council appoints a private contractor to undertake this work.

5. Key issues and proposals

- 5.1 Under the proposed five year agreement Wyre will receive £97,896 in year one and this will be uplifted each April linked to RPI, with no further budgetary reduction providing all services listed above are undertaken by the council to the required levels. As such, the income received from LCC will increase slightly each year reflecting increases to the council.
- Whilst the services provided can be accommodated within the proposed budget there would still be an ongoing subsidy provided by Wyre Council which is estimated at £8,395, whilst higher than the previous subsidy is still a significant reduction on pre 2018 rates.
 - The subsidy reflects the ongoing subsidy from previous years in relation to verges and is projected to rise going forward as a result of an increase in costs associated with the weed control contract.
- 5.3 The council will require the ability to terminate the agreement or remove the requirement in relation to weed control, should the external contracting prices increase substantially or there be changes in legislative practices.
- 5.4 The council has a separate agreement in relation to Public Rights of Way; this is outside this remit and the council receive £1,160 per annum as a fixed sum.

6. Delegated functions

6.1 The matters referred to in this report are considered under the following executive function delegated to the Street Scene, Parks and Open Spaces Portfolio Holder (as set out in Part 3 of the council's constitution): namely "to consider issues relating to the development and co-ordination of the Council's approach to 'street scene'".

Financial and legal implications			
Finance	LCC will pay a contribution of £97,896 in 2021/22, uplifted each year by RPI in the following four years (five year term) towards the various highways related maintenance activities described in the report above. The value of the subsidy will be increased to £8,395 per annum.		
Legal	An agreement with LCC for delivery of the public realm services as outlined in the report will be entered into.
