Wyre Council Tree Preservation Order No 9 of 2023: Heyswood House, Head Dyke Lane, Pilling, PR3 6SJ.

### 1. Purpose of report

**1.1** To consider the objection to the making of Wyre Council Tree Preservation Order No 9 of 2023: Heyswood House, Head Dyke Lane, Pilling, PR3 6SJ.

#### 2. Outcomes

- **2.1** To determine whether or not to confirm the Wyre Council Tree Preservation Order No 9 of 2023: Heyswood House, Head Dyke Lane, Pilling, PR3 6SJ.
- 2.2 An effective tree preservation order makes it an offence to do any works to the protected trees without first gaining consent from the Local Planning Authority unless such works are covered by an exemption within the Town and Country Planning (Tree Preservation) (England) Regulations 2012.

#### 3. Recommendation

3.1 That Wyre Council Tree Preservation Order No 9 of 2023: Heyswood House, Head Dyke Lane, Pilling, PR3 6SJ be confirmed without modification.

#### 4. Legislative background to the TPO

4.1 Section 198 of The Town and Country Planning Act 1990 (as amended) empowers Local Planning Authorities to protect trees or woodlands in their area in the interests of amenity by making tree preservation orders. Following the introduction of The Town and Country Planning (Tree Preservation) (England) Regulations 2012, The Local Planning

Authority is required to confirm a tree preservation order within six months of the issue date if it is to continue to have effect after that period. When an objection is received, a decision on confirmation is usually referred to the Planning Committee.

- Tree preservation orders are usually made because it is considered expedient in the interests of amenity to protect the trees from felling or pruning. Authorities can also consider other sources of risks to trees with significant amenity value. For example, changes in property ownership and intentions to fell trees are not always known in advance, so it may sometimes be appropriate to proactively make an order as a precaution.
- 4.3 Amenity is not defined in law but the government's advice is that authorities need to exercise judgement when deciding whether it is within their powers to make an Order. Orders should be used to protect selected trees and woodlands if their removal would have a significant negative impact on the local environment and its enjoyment by the public. Before authorities make or confirm an Order they should be able to show that protection would bring a reasonable degree of public benefit in the present or future (GOV.UK, 2014).
- **4.4** Therefore the following criteria should be taken into account when assessing the amenity value of trees:
  - Visibility: the extent to which the trees or woodlands can be seen
    by the general public will inform the LPA's assessment of whether
    its impact on the local environment is significant. The trees, or at
    least part of them, should normally be visible from a public place,
    such as a road or footpath, or accessible by the public.
  - Individual, collective and wider impact: public visibility alone will
    not be sufficient to warrant an Order. The authority is advised to also
    assess the particular importance of an individual tree, of groups of
    trees or of woodlands by reference to it of their characteristics
    including:
  - Size and form;
  - Future potential as amenity;
  - Rarity or historic value;
  - Contribution to, and relationship with, the landscape; and
  - Contribution to the character or appearance of a conservation area.
  - Other factors: where relevant to an assessment of the amenity value of trees or woodlands, authorities may consider taking into account other factors, such as importance to nature conservation or response to climate change, although according to guidance these "Other factors" alone would not warrant the making an order.

# (Source: Tree Preservation Orders and trees in Conservation Areas/Planning Practice Guidance March 2014).

- 4.5 The Regulation 5 notice, which is a legal notice that is served with the tree preservation order documents on the owner and occupier of the land affected by a tree preservation order and also the owner and occupier of the adjoining land, states the reason why the trees have been protected and invites objections or representations to be made to the Local Planning Authority within a 28-day period. The Regulation 5 Notice issued in respect of the land affected by the TPO gave the reason for making the TPO as "it is expedient in the interest of amenity".
- 4.6 Once made, a tree preservation order takes effect provisionally for six months, but must be confirmed by the Local Planning Authority within that period to continue to be effective. If it is not confirmed the tree preservation order ceases to have effect and the trees are unprotected. When objections or representations are received the Council must consider those before any decision is made whether or not to confirm the order. In these cases, referral to Planning Committee is usually appropriate.
- **4.7** Within the framework of a TPO, a Local Planning Authority may classify trees as occurring either as individuals, groups, woodlands, or areas.

## 5. Background to making the TPO

**5.1** On 28 April 2023 the Tree Officer received a request from the owner of Heyswood House to visit the property to consider the suitability of trees there for Tree Preservation Order.

The Tree Officer visited site on 04 May 2023 and undertook an appropriate tree evaluation method for preservation orders ("TEMPO") which guided the subsequent decision to make the TPO. A copy of the completed TEMPO survey data sheet relating to the TPO along with- an image of the TPO are appended to this report at Appendix 1.

5.2 On 19 July 2023 Wyre Council made Wyre Council Tree Preservation Order No 9 of 2023: Heyswood House, Head Dyke Lane, Pilling, PR3 6SJ. A copy of the TPO plan is appended to this report at Appendix 2.

The Council served correspondence on the owners and occupiers of the land affected by the TPO and on those adjoining, notifying them of the making of the TPO in accordance with Regulation 5 of the Town and Country Planning (Tree Preservation) (England) Regulations 2012.

5.3 The period for any objections and representations to be made to the Council in respect of the TPO ended on 16 August 2023.

The Council received an objection via e-mail on 30 July 2023. A redacted copy of the objection and corresponding redacted e-mails are appended to this report at Appendix 3.

#### 6. Summary of Objections

#### 6.1

T1, T4, T5, T6, T7 and W1 specified in the schedule are on the boundaries of agricultural land. These is an ongoing requirement to remove branches to ensure a safe and accessible working height for agricultural machinery.

#### 6.2

It would be very inconvenient to have to obtain permission from Wyre Council prior to carrying out any of this work and also impractical to be restricted to obtaining permission during office hours only.

## 7.0 Response to Objections

- **7.1** The Tree Officer agrees that it is necessary to maintain sufficient clearance for agricultural contractors to work safely beneath T1, T4, T5, T6, T7 and.
- 7.2 To address this necessity the Tree Officer puts forward that the objector could complete a tree works application form to request consent to remove the branches from the subject trees that are encroaching over agricultural land to provide headroom clearance of no greater than 5.5 metres from ground level (on the field beneath the trees). Dead branches along with storm failed branches can be removed under exception from the need to apply for consent.
- 7.3 If the advice in 7.2 is followed and tree works consent is formally provided it could be stipulated therein that it runs for a period of 5 years from the date consent is given and provides for any repeated need for tree works of this nature within that period. For convenience this could be reviewed on a 5 Yearly basis.
- 7.4 In all the circumstances, officer view is that it is expedient in the interests of amenity to make all trees within the schedule subject of a confirmed tree preservation order.

Advice pertaining to Planning Committee and its procedures along with a copy of this report relating to the TPO have been forwarded to the party that objected in reasonable advance of the meeting of Planning Committee on 4<sup>th</sup> October 2023.

### 8.0 Concluding remarks

- 8.1 It is considered that the TPO has been properly made in the interests of securing the contribution and benefit that the TPO applies to the public amenity in the area. The TPO protects important elements of the local landscape and contributes to the local environment. The individual trees and the woodland trees presently protected by the TPO have been assessed in a structured and consistent way using an approved method.
- 8.2 It is considered that the procedural requirements of the legislation have been followed in the creation of the TPO and determinations made using a widely accepted method which includes expediency assessment has occurred in this case. Having regard to the legislation and the Government Guidance, it is considered that the TPO is fully justified in all respects and should be confirmed.

Financial and Legal Implications

Legal	Before confirming a Tree Preservation Order, the Local Planning Authority must consider any objections/representations made within the 28-day objection period. If, having considered any objections/representations received, the Local Planning Authority is satisfied that the tree merits a TPO; it may confirm the Order under the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 and supporting Regulations. The LPA may also confirm an Order in modified form, revoke it, or allow it to lapse. However it cannot add to the Schedule references to a tree to which the Order did not previously apply. There is no right of appeal to the Secretary of State, but a challenge may be made to the High Court on a point of law.





I wish to object to the above Tree Preservation Order on the grounds that several of the trees specified in the schedule are on the boundaries of agricultural land which we farm.

These are: T1, T4, T5, T6, T7 and W1

We have in the past and will need to do so in the future, remove branches from these trees

Over hanging branches prevent us and agricultural contractors from working beneath them and we must be able to cut them back to a safe and accessible working height.

Previously substantial boughs have partially broken off from T7 and have required cutting off completely. We must still be able to do this with any of the trees along the boundaries.

It would be very inconvenient to have to obtain permission from Wyre Council prior to carrying out any of this work and also impractical to be restricted to obtaining permission during office hours only.

We are very committed to maintaining and promoting biodiverse environmental practises and consequently farm organically. Our land is Soil Association registered and our livestock and growing enterprises are Soil Association approved. We therefore ensure that any intervention we undertake is carried out with the minimum impact on all aspects of the natural environment. However, I do feel this Tree Preservation Order would be prohibitive.
